



I. LEGISLATION

- a. The constitution:
 - i. Is there a provision limiting marriage to a man and a woman?
 - ii. Is there an anti-discrimination provision?
 - If so, is does this provision prohibit discrimination on the grounds of sexuality?
 - a. This may be based on how the statute has been interpreted by the courts. Try your best to find a website for the country's constitutional court and investigate whether this question has been addressed.
- b. The criminal/penal code
 - i. Is it illegal to have homosexual relations?
 - Has this provision been enforced?
 - a. Do a Google search for articles on any prosecutions.
 - ii. Is the age of consent higher for a homosexual relationship than for a heterosexual relationship?
- c. A human rights code
 - i. Is there a code?
 - ii. On what grounds can a person claim discrimination?
- d. Other issues that may be found in a statute
 - i. Can homosexual people serve in the military?
 - ii. Can homosexual people marry?
 - iii. Can LGBT people adopt?

- Once you know the name of the statute, a basic Google search may turn up an electronic copy.

Even if this law is in another language, we want to know where it is.

Finally, we want to know if there are any proposed changes in the law that would positively/negatively affect LGBT people. Please do a Google search for news articles to determine if there is legislation in the works.

II. CANADIAN JURISPRUDENCE

Information to look for:

- a. Treatment of LGBT people from the same country at the IRB.
- b. Treatment of LGBT people from the same country at the Federal Court (on judicial review).
- c. Cases of LGBT people from similar countries (with similar cultural backgrounds) – this is only necessary if you cannot find sufficient cases from the assigned country.

To find these cases, please check the following sources:

- Quicklaw database for Federal Court cases (judicial review): QuickLaw>>Court Cases>>Federal Court of Canada, Group Source>>Enter search terms
 - a. Please try the following search terms: *Your country* AND gay OR homosexual OR lesbian AND refugee
- the Michigan-Melbourne Refugee Caselaw Site at www.refugeecaselaw.org. The site contains jurisprudence from a multitude of asylum countries, and can be organized by the claimant's country of origin and by issue (such as sexual orientation). Refugee Case Law Homepage>>Search>>Enter search criteria

III. DOMESTIC JURISPRUDENCE

Information to look for:

- a. Constitutional rights cases involving LGBT claimants from the country being studied
 - a. What was the claimant's challenge? What was the remedy sought?
 - b. If the claim was unsuccessful, what were the reasons?
 - c. If the claim was successful, what was the impact of that ruling on LGBT rights in that country?

To find answers to these questions, use these resources as a starting point:

 - b. Select your country's report from database. If the country has a link marked 'UPDATE' use that report rather than the original report.
 - c. The report will detail how and where to search different legal information and materials from that country.

 - a. Select 'Foreign Law Guide' from available databases, and select your country

- b. The guide for each country will provide the best sources for primary and secondary sources on legal information and reports from that country.
- c. Be aware that the Electronic Law Library is often only accessible from campus!

IV. INTERNATIONAL LAW

Information to look for:

- a. Treatment of LGBT claimants at regional human rights courts
 - a. Has the country signed and ratified any regional human rights conventions (European Convention on Human Rights, American Convention on Human Rights, Africa Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights)?
 - b. Have discrimination claims based on LGBT status been brought before the court or body responsible for supervising compliance with those conventions (European Convention on Human Rights, American Convention on Human Rights, Africa Charter on Human and Peoples' Rights)?
 - c. What were the reasons given for upholding or rejecting the claim?
 - d. Focus only on case-law directly involving the country being studied, rather than the LGBT rights jurisprudence of human rights courts more broadly.
- b. Treatment of LGBT claimants by international human rights treaty-monitoring bodies
 - a. Has the country signed and ratified major human rights instruments at the UN?
 - i. Focus on the ICCPR, ICESCR, and CAT, and Optional Protocols of each
 - b. Review the last two country reports from the relevant Treaty Body and summarize any findings or recommendations relevant to LGBT rights
 - i. Human Rights Committee – monitors ICCPR
 - ii. Committee on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights – monitors ICESCR
 - iii. Committee Against Torture – monitors CAT
 - c. Summarize any relevant complaints made under the Optional Protocols of each treaty – focus only on complaints directly involving the country being studied
 - d. Review the last two reviews from the Universal Periodic Reviews of the country by the Human Rights Council and summarize any findings or recommendations relevant to LGBT rights
 - e. Summarize Special Procedures of the Human Rights Council
 - i. Country Mandates – include any relevant reports from the country mandate in the country being studied (if any)
 - ii. Thematic Mandates - include any relevant country specific reports from the following thematic mandate bodies:
 - Adequate Housing
 - Arbitrary Detention
 - Extrajudicial Executions
 - Peaceful Assembly and Association
 - Freedom of Expression
 - Human Rights Defenders
 - Minority Issues
 - Torture

Shadow Reports

- Shadow reports are a method for NGOs to supplement or present alternative information to the government reports that states submit under the treaties

 - Select the relevant Treaty Body from the list (ex: Human Rights Committee)
 - Click on 'Sessions' on that Treaty Body's page and select the country you are researching

 - Look for the headings 'Info from Civil Society Organizations' and 'Follow-up information from other sources' for the shadow reports from NGOs.

- Is the state protecting LGBT people from persecution, or persecuting them?
 - o What is the attitude of the police to LGBT people?
- Are certain parts of the country safer than others for LGBT people?

- Local LGBT NGOs which may have prepared reports. If you do not find a report (many of the organization have produced translations of their reports, and SOGI may be able to translate sections), it is often helpful to contact a representative asking about the availability of any materials documenting LGBT human rights abuses. Some organizations have been willing to provide letters in support of refugee claimants in the past.

VII. MEDIA REPORTS

Questions to investigate:

- What has happened in the country that relates to LGBT people?
 - o Attacks/threats against LGBT people. Who committed these - the public? The police? Gangs?
 - o Pride parade or other awareness events. How was this received?

- Prosecutions of LGBT people under the country's criminal code (e.g. for indecent behaviour, homosexual activity)
- Election of gay politicians/leaders.
- What is the public opinion of LGBT people? Look for:
 - Editorials/letters about LGBT people – is there a positive or negative perspective of these people?
 - Articles on actions by political or religious groups/ authorities that oppose LGBT groups.

 - a. Login. Click on the “news and companies” tab in the top right. Use the “geography” index terms option to narrow your search to the country of interest, and change the sources you search to further narrow your search. You may also search specific dates for older or more recent events.

 - What is the attitude of the police to LGBT people?
- Are certain parts of the country safer than others for LGBT people?

Note: this will take you to “Scholar’s Portal,” which will allow you to search under specific journals or more specific topics under the “Advanced Search” tab.
 - b. Please try the following search terms: *Your country* AND gay OR homosexual OR lesbian
 - c. Check these results carefully – Scholar’s Portal will be the only major source you check, so don’t let anything slip past you!
